

House Bill 470aa (2014 session) created a Wolf Control Board and requires that two (2) cents of wool assessments collected under I.C. 25-131 be designated and contributed as a wolf control assessment. Clarification needs to be made in the rule regarding testing for Brucellosis in dairy goats and entry requirements into Idaho for sheep/goat breeding stock headed for livestock auctions is also needed.

Provide a short summary of the changes this rule makes:

The rule will reflect the changes allowed by legislation passed in 2012 and 2014. An 80 cent per head assessment on goats will be established and an increase from 8 cents to 10 cents per pound on wool assessments will occur. A total of 20 cents per head on goats and 2 cents per pound of wool will go to the newly created "Wolf Control Fund".

Changes to the Brucellosis testing for breeding goats entering Idaho will entail employing a more broad-based test. The rule will also drop the requirement that a health certificate is needed for out-of-state sheep & goat breeding stock headed for an Idaho livestock auction. The livestock will be inspected by veterinarians at the auction. A proper age of eligibility for goat Brucellosis testing will also be determined.
